

Gospel Connection: The elusive answer to “Why?” It’s becoming more and more of a challenge for parents of young children today: talking to them about God.

When children show an interest in God or start asking questions about their faith, many parents feel conflicted between their faith in God and the controversies surrounding religious institutions and the failures of many of its leaders. While their children’s spiritual imaginations are growing, their parents’ anxieties and sadness about the inevitable disappointments the world would serve up make those conversations difficult — especially among parents who feel insecure about their own grasp of faith, whose own childhood religious formation was largely a negative experience.

Parents experience similar feelings of loss and inadequacy when struggling to answer their children’s “how come?” regarding violence, sexism and racism. How do white parents explain that what is “normal” for their children isn’t always normal for families of color? How do you reassure children that the places that should be safe — like their schools — sometimes are not?

Meghan Murphy-Gill is the mother of a five-year-old. In an essay in U.S. Catholic [July 2019], the Chicago writer reflects on her own experience of trying to explain life’s painful truths to her own son: “I don’t try to protect my son’s innocence. That might seem counterintuitive to some parents, but in my experience going to lengths to shield him from the cruel realities of the world only makes my own anxieties worse — and his. Our children do active shooter drills in elementary schools, after all. They want to know why. But they also want our assurances that we will do everything to protect them . . . One of the reasons my husband and I decided to baptize our son was because the Christian story was not only the story we had been raised with but also one we believe is holy and filled with truth. It reminds us that, yes, the world can be a terrible place and do terrible things, but those terrible things don’t have the last word.”

The vulnerability and fragileness of our lives are at the heart of today’s difficult passage from Luke’s Gospel. In the divisions we suffer, in the contradictions we encounter, in the disconnect between our faith and values and the demands and expectations of our world and culture, the love of God is the one constant that brings us back to one another, that heals the rifts, that bridges what divides between us. The compassion, the selflessness, the humility, the justice that Jesus demands of those who would be his disciples are the “fire” and “baptism” through which we transform our world in the sacredness of God. Discipleship is not without cost; balancing the Gospel’s ethical and moral imperatives with the day-to-day practical realities of our lives is difficult. The challenge of discipleship, Jesus teaches, is not to let God’s word of justice and mercy divide us but to realize how that word can bring all humanity together as God’s holy people.
